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I. INTRODUCTION

The Department of Chinese Literature has a history of seventy years. Throughout this time, it has maintained a four-year university curriculum, allowing students ample time for learning. The courses cover literature, history, philosophy, and arts, with equal emphasis on classical and modern subjects. This enables students to study ancient and contemporary works while being immersed in Chinese culture, thus enhancing their literary accomplishments and moral character.

Tradition

In 1947, Chu Hai University was established in Guangzhou, and The Department of Chinese and History (predecessor of The Department of Chinese Literature) became one of the departments under the Faculty of Arts. Apart from the University of Hong Kong, it was the oldest Department of Chinese Literature in Hong Kong.

In 1949, Chu Hai University relocated to Hong Kong, becoming the present-day Hong Kong Chu Hai College. The Chinese Department attracted numerous scholars and intellectuals, priding itself on its profound understanding of ancient and modern Chinese literature, making it the first choice for students pursuing Chinese literature studies.

In 1969, the Institute of Chinese History and Literature was established, with Professor Lo Hsiang-lin 羅香林 invited by President Kong Mou Sum 江茂森 to serve as its first director. The institute aimed to cultivate masters and doctors in literature and history, paving the way for undergraduate students in The Department of Chinese Literature to pursue advanced studies.

Over the decades, the faculty of the department has included many distinguished scholars and literary giants. During the Guangzhou period, there was Professor Shang Ch'eng-tso 商承祚, the student of Luo Zhenyu 羅振玉, who studied oracle bone and bronze inscriptions, becoming a renowned figure in archaeology. After the relocation to Hong Kong, Huang Huabiao 黃華表 served as the department head, excelling in ancient poetry and prose with unique insights, particularly in researching documents

from the Lingnan region. His contributions were significant. His successor, Peng Guodong 彭國棟, founded *Asian Poetry*《亞洲詩壇》 and also edited *Qingshi*《清 史》, making him a prominent figure in literature and history. Subsequent department heads were also outstanding scholars. The teaching staff came from various regions, each with specialized knowledge in fields such as literary and historical criticism, textual research, historical records, poetry, and novel writing, all of whom were accomplished in their respective areas. Many students who studied under these scholars went on to achieve success in various fields, including academia, education, publishing, journalism, religion, and traditional Chinese medicine, contributing their expertise and talents to society.

MASTER OF ARTS IN HISTORY AND CULTURE OF SOUTH CHINA

Introduction

On February 18, 2019, The State Council of the People's Republic of China released the "Outline Development Plan for the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area", which is a significant development strategy under the new era of China's reform and opening-up. The plan covers the period from the near future until 2022 and extends to the year 2035. Now, it has been over three years since its announcement. The Greater Bay Area is a vibrant urban cluster, known for its deep regional cooperation and integration in areas such as infrastructure, finance, and innovation. The development plan also aims to make the Greater Bay Area a hub for cultural exchanges between China and foreign countries and a world-class tourist destination. Furthermore, it contributes to Hong Kong's transformation into a hub for international artistic and cultural exchanges under the "Outline of the Fourteenth Five-Year Plan". In September 2022, The Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences of Hong Kong Chu Hai College launched the "History and Culture of South China" master's program, with a particular focus on teaching the history and culture of the Greater Bay Area. This program helps students grasp the development context of various cities in the region and their frequent interactions. Through the teaching of South China's history, integrating history and culture, the program aims to cultivate students' ability for independent research, provide them with an international perspective, and produce outstanding talents who are adept at innovation and adaptation.

Features

1. Mastering the History of the Greater Bay Area - Inheriting South China Culture:

The languages, arts, cuisines, customs, and traditions of Guangdong, Hong Kong, and Macao are all integral parts of a unified culture, with Hong Kong and South China cities sharing the same cultural origin. By analyzing this historical process in the course, students can understand the hardships faced by their predecessors in exploration and development, and thus learn to cherish and inherit this cultural heritage.

2. Training Interdisciplinary Experts - Embracing Multidimensional Knowledge:

The curriculum not only emphasizes academic methodologies but also keeps pace with the times. The two subject groups, history and culture, are designed to cultivate a solid foundation in historical studies, allowing students to understand the historical and cultural exchanges between China and the West, with a particular focus on the historical and cultural development of the Greater Bay Area and Southeast Asia. The cultural subjects can be applied in various professional fields in today's society, supporting the development of intangible cultural heritage conservation, cultural tourism, museum management, and more.

3.Experienced Instructors Leading Research - Supported by Field Study Teaching:

The tutor, who has conducted long-term research on the history and culture of South China, serves as the museum curator and a researcher, teaching various subjects. In addition to regular lectures, they also lead students on field trips to historical sites in Hong Kong and the South China region, deepening their understanding of the history and culture of South China and its neighboring areas.

Programme Structure

The curriculum is built on a credit unit system, and students are required to take three core courses, including Introduction to Studies of South China (3 credits), Cultural Heritage and Conservation (3 credits), and Academic Report (6 credits), totaling 12 credits. In addition, students are required to take six elective courses (3 credits per course) totaling 18 credits, making a total of 30 credits.
